A PLACE AT THE TABLE: Social Justice in an Ageing Society.

Today the Church celebrates Social Justice Sunday.

The ageing of the population has been rightly described as 'the great success story of human development' and 'the most positive development in the last century of human history'.

The number of Australians aged 65 and over will more than double from 3.6 million today to 8.9 million by the middle of the century. Where once retirement was considered a period of rest and declining health, we now speak of 'active ageing' in an 'extended life course' – a transition through the 50s to the 80s, with changing activities and concerns as time goes on.

We should give thanks to God for the grace of a long life and for the prosperous and modern society we live in. We should be grateful for the inheritance we have received from previous generations. Their generosity can be seen, not only in the fruits of their labour and advances in science and technology, but also in the many institutions and policies promoting the common good and assisting people struggling through difficult times.

It can be easy to take these things for granted. We can forget the great challenges faced by earlier generations, which inspired a sense of social justice that cried out 'never again!' to the impacts of economic depressions, world wars, disease and natural disasters.

It is vital that our society continues to support all Australians, especially the most vulnerable. This Social Justice Statement emphasises the role and value of older people in Australian life. We demand that

their contribution is never reduced to a mere economic valuation. We call for a higher level of care for older people who are frail and vulnerable. The sanctity and dignity of their lives must be defended against a 'throw-away' culture. And we urge a renewed solidarity among generations young and old – ensuring all are valued and included.

Older Australians are a treasure – 'a wealth not to be ignored'. We must acknowledge the legacy of our elders as we plan for the future. Will we ensure they find their rightful place at the table? Will we ourselves come to the table on the vital issue of social justice in an ageing society?

From Pope Francis:

Just as God asks us to be his means of hearing the cry of the poor, so too he wants us to hear the cry of the elderly. This represents a challenge to families and communities, since 'the Church cannot and does not want to conform to a mentality of impatience, and much less of indifference and contempt, towards old age. We must reawaken the collective sense of gratitude, of appreciation, of hospitality, which makes the elderly feel like a living part of the community. Our elderly are men and women, fathers and mothers, who came before us on our own road, in our own house, in our daily battle for a worthy life'. Indeed, 'how I would like a Church that challenges the throw-away culture by the overflowing joy of a new embrace between young and old!'

OUR PATRON SAINT:

Saint Michael the Archangel isn't a saint, but rather he is an angel, and the leader of all angels and of the army of God. This is what the title "Archangel" means, that he is above all the others in rank.

St. Michael has four main responsibilities or offices, as we know from scripture and Christian tradition.

- The first is to combat Satan.
- The second is to escort the faithful to heaven at their hour of death.
- The third is to be a champion of all Christians, and the Church itself.
- And the fourth is to call men from life on Earth to their heavenly judgment.

Very little is known about St Michael other than what we know from scriptures, which themselves are sparse

In Daniel, St. Michael is mentioned twice. The first time as one who helped Daniel, and the second time he is mentioned with regard to the end times of the world when he will stand for the "children of thy people."

His next mention comes in the Epistle of St. Jude, where St. Michael is said to guard the tombs of Moses and Eve and has contended with Satan over the body of Moses.

The final mention is in Revelation, where St. Michael and his angels, do battle with the dragon.

There are other scriptures where St. Michael is implied, but not mentioned by name, such as the angel; who defends the gate to Paradise, who defends against Balaam, and "who routed the army of Sennacherib."

Today, St. Michel is invoked for protection, especially from lethal enemies. Patron of grocers, soldiers, doctors, mariners, paratroopers, police, and sickness.

when clocks will go forward one hour at 2am and will conclude on **Sunday, 2 April 2017**, when clocks will go backwards one hour at 3am.

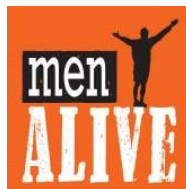
FEAST DAY OF ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI: The Morwell Parishes invite all to join in their celebrations of the Feast of St Francis on Sunday October 2 at the Sacred Heart Church, 266 Commercial Road, Morwell. The celebrations commence at 2:00pm with Mass, a procession and benediction, followed by refreshments in the School Hall.

AND ANOTHER SAINT: On **September 27**, we celebrate the Feast day of **St Vincent de Paul**, one of our better known Saints, thanks to the sterling work of the many Vinnies volunteers around the globe. We are blessed to have a strong Vinnies Chapter right here in Traralgon.

St Vincent de Paul was born to a French peasant family in 1580. He was a highly intelligent youth and was educated by the Franciscans for several years, before being ordained at the age of 20. In 1605 he was captured by Turkish pirates who sold him into slavery, but won his freedom after he converted one of his masters to Christianity. After returning to France, he served as a parish priest near Paris and began to establish charitable organisations that helped the poor, nursed the sick and found work for the unemployed. St Vincent founded the Congregation of the Daughters of Charity with Louise de Marillac, and instituted the Congregation of Priests of the Mission, also known as the Lazarists. Today the Society of St Vincent de Paul provides relief to people in need across the world.

And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to fill himself with the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

"In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things come your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

"The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead.""
