## <u>New Testament Reflection</u> <u>by Mary Coloe PBVM</u> God, I'll believe if ...John 20:19-31 "Doubt no longer but believe."

Thomas' role in the Easter narrative is to reveal how hard faith is. No matter what the other disciples say Thomas cannot change death to resurrection without certain criteria being met. He places conditions on God – 'I need to see the holes and touch the living body.'

Real faith means letting go such conditions. We are challenged to surrender our human doubts, our expectations, and our normal rational systems of proof. The other disciples come to faith when they actually *see* Jesus; this is what Thomas asks for – sight of the Risen One. Jesus doesn't rebuke Thomas, but he speaks words of blessing for those who can go beyond Thomas and believe without seeing him – for those who will believe without conditions.

Today we do not have the risen Jesus visible in our midst, as did those first disciples. Like the Beloved Disciple in last Sunday's Gospel, we are called to have faith in more subtle signs. We have the written testimony of those first believers, we have the living witness of other Christians today, and we have those divine stirrings in our own lives inviting rather than compelling belief. At the end of the Gospel, the evangelist turns to us to say, 'I have written these things so that you may believe and have life.' In this way, the evangelist speaks to his first century readers and across the centuries to us.

Jesus also seems to turn aside from the disciples and gaze into the future centuries to the many who come after,

and Jesus' final words are addressed to these future believers. 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe.' This is our blessing.

Creation symbolism continues with the specific time references: the 'first day' and 'eight days later,' which are associated with the dawn of a new creation. The old creation was completed on the seventh day; the eighth day is the first day of a new creation. You might notice that many baptismal fonts and baptisteries have eight sides to signify that in baptism we are reborn into a new creation.

When speaking about the Christian 'Sabbath,' an ancient writer wrote – 'not the Sabbaths of the present era ... but that which I have appointed to mark the end of the world and to usher in the eighth day, that is, the dawn of another world.' This, by the way, is why we joyfully celebrate the eighth day – the same day on which Jesus rose from the dead. (Ep. Barn. 15:8-9)

When Jesus comes to the disciples, this is the first time that they are sent on mission. Where the Synoptics have Jesus send the disciples on mission while Jesus' own ministry continues, in John, their mission begins in the post-resurrection time. With the gift of the Spirit breathed onto them, they are sent to continue the mission of Jesus in the world. 'As the Father has sent me, so I send you. ... Receive the Holy Spirit.' (20:21, 22). There are two aspects of this mission. They are sent to forgive sin (20:23), and to gather people: 'whoever you hold, are held' (20:23

# **New Testament Reflection** by Mary Coloe PBVM

## (Continued from Page 1)

This phrase (20:23) is often read in the light of the Synoptic expression that speaks of binding and loosing, in relation to Peter's authority (Matt 16:19). While the first part of the phrase clearly states, 'if you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven,' the second part does not mention the word sin and is better understood to mean holding firm to one another in community. In Jesus' prayer on the eve of his 'hour' he had prayed, 'While I was with them I kept them in your name ...; I have guarded them and none of them is lost (17:12). Now the task of 'keeping' and 'guarding' is passed onto his disciples.

The reading from Acts testifies to the mission of these disciples. They are to be a community of generous sharing of resources so that no-one goes in need. Could we imagine what that might be like? There is no need to cling to 'this is mine,' or be driven to store up incredible wealth. This ideal is lived out by many small communities, some in and recognised formal religious communities, others in informal groups. It calls for deep trust in each other, for patience with the limitations of others, for genuine humility and deep gratitude. These values are named in the First epistle of John as love. When communities can live with such values they offer an alternative vision of life to what advertising and the media present. Such communities have 'overcome the world'.

# Second Reading 1

## 1 Jn 5:1-6

A reading from the first letter of St John

Anyone begotten by God has already overcome the world.

Whoever believes that Jesus is the Christ has been begotten by God; and whoever loves the Father that begot him loves the child whom he begets.

We can be sure that we love God's children if we love God himself and do what he has commanded us; this is what loving God is –

keeping his commandments; and his commandments are not difficult, because anyone who has been begotten by God has already overcome the world; this is the victory over the world – our faith. Who can overcome the world? Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God; Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness – since the Spirit is the truth.

Alleluia, alleluia! You believe in me, Thomas, because you have seen me; happy are those who have not seen me, but still believe! Alleluia!

## **Gospel** Jn 20:19-31

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John After eight days, Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.'

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.
