Pope Francis offers advice about how to face the daily challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic:

"We need to rediscover the concreteness of small things, the small acts of kindness shown to those who are close to us, family, friends. We need to realize that our treasure lies in small things. There are tiny gestures that sometimes get lost in the routine of everyday life, gestures of tenderness, affection, compassion, that are nevertheless decisive, important", he says.

The Pope gives the examples of sharing "a hot plate of food, a caress, a hug, a phone call... These are familiar, attentive gestures regarding everyday details that make life meaningful, and create communion and communication amongst us".

Suggestions for Practical Response to Spiritual and Pastoral Needs in St. Michael's Parish

For discussion by the Pastoral Council

Suggestion 1: In times of great tension and stress people gravitate towards the church for time in prayer and to be surrounded by the familiar aspects of their faith life: the icon of Our Lady, lighting a candle under the statue of the virgin, praying in front of the Blessed Sacrament, the tranquil atmosphere of the sanctuary.

To facilitate this opportunity, the following suggestion is made:

- The church remains open during the day for personal visits to pray
- leaflets in the church with weekly Sunday readings and commentary
- list of websites with Scriptural & devotional material... podcasts and videos
- roped off area in the church for private prayer and contemplation around the statue of Our Lady
- Supply of hand sanitizer on the table at the Kay Street entrance.
- This smaller area is more easily cleaned on a regular basis.

Suggestion 2: The pastoral needs of the community will come into stark contrast as the weeks unfold and we can put several strategies into place to care for those most vulnerable in our parish and community.

- Adopt a Parishioner... regular telephone conversations and practical support with shopping and personal needs. A register can be kept through the parish office of who is keeping contact with whom
- **Creation of a Volunteer Pool** who will respond to emergencies within the parish community
- Liaising with Vinnies to create a 'frozen food bank' so that the volunteer pool can drop off food to people who are unable to shop or cook for themselves
- Mick's Kitchen Take Away ... consideration given to the possibilities of offering takeaway food at a re-opened Mick's Kitchen. Negotiation with Vinnies for the use of the venue & the Latrobe City to allow take away food to be distributed
- **Emergency Accommodation...** accommodation and self-isolating facilities be organised by the parish somewhere in the town so that, in an emergency, it can be offered to people who need this and have nowhere else to go.
- **Communion to the Sick** and those in nursing homes should be resumed as soon as practical. There must be a way communion can be distributed to those most in need of the Sacrament.
