SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY by Dianne Bergant CSA

Peter's Christology is rooted in Israel's prophetic tradition. With language reminiscent of the Suffering Servant tradition (cf. Isa 53:11-12), he calls Jesus God's Servant and describes him as a righteous sufferer. He traces God's action from the promises to the ancestors, to the choice of Moses as leader of the people to freedom, and finally to the glorification of the crucified Jesus. He contracts light and darkness, insisting that, despite the strength of the powers of death, the forces of life are ultimately triumphant. While Peter blames his hearers for the death of Jesus, he acquits them of some of the guilt by ascribing their offence to ignorance. From God's point of view, Jesus' suffering and death bring their messianic expectations to fulfilment.

The responsorial psalm expresses both lament and confidence. The verses open with the psalmist in great distress, turning to God and pleading for relief. Relying on the blessings of that past, the psalmist is confident that God will intervene. Faith and confidence are based on both personal innocence and divine trustworthiness. The appeal for God's favour is taken from the ancient blessing of the high priest Aaron (cf. Num 6:25f). The image suggests that God's face lights up with pleasure at the sight of the righteous. The psalmist is filled with joy as a result of the relationship with God. Confidence in God fills him with gladness and calms his fears and anxieties.

Knowledge of God is a very important theme in the Letter of John. This passage, which insists that true knowledge leads to observance of God's commandments, seems to denounce gnosticism, which claims that knowledge itself is salvific. The major portion of the reading offers encouragement for those times when the Christians stray from righteousness and do in fact sin. In these times, Jesus will be an advocate (*paráklitos*) for them before God. Several themes together provide a profile of the exalted Christ: He is now in the presence of God, having been raised from the dead; he is righteous, despite the fact that he was condemned to death as a criminal; his blood is the sacrificial offering that atones for sins. Finally, there is an eschatological character to God's love.

The gospel passage identifies the two major themes found in most post-resurrection appearance accounts: the experience of the risen Lord; and the ritual meal of the community. Jesus addresses his disciples with the customary Jewish greeting: Peace be with you! They are terrified, for they think he is a ghost. After rebuking them for having doubts, Jesus attempts to dispel their doubts by showing that it is really he. The final demonstration of his corporeal reality is his eating a piece of cooked fish.

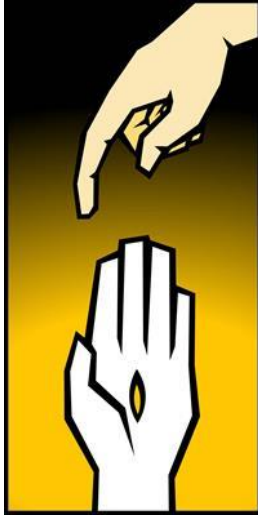



A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

You have killed the prince of life; God, however, raised him from the dead.

Peter said to the people: 'You are Israelites, and it is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our ancestors, who has glorified his servant Jesus, the same Jesus you handed over and then disowned in the presence of Pilate, after Pilate had decided to release him. It was you who accused the Holy One, the Just One, you who demanded the reprieve of a murderer while you killed the prince of life. God, however, raised him from the dead, and to that fact we are the witnesses.

'Now I know, brothers, that neither you nor your leaders had any idea what you were really doing; this was the way God carried out what he had foretold, when he said through all his prophets that his Christ would suffer. Now you must repent and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out.'

Gospel Lk 24:35-48

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

It was written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead.

The disciples told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised Jesus at the breaking of bread.

They were still talking about all this when Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you!' In a state of alarm and fright, they thought they were seeing a ghost. But he said, 'Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have.' And as he said this he showed them his hands and feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' And they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes.

Then he told them, 'This is what I meant when I said, while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses, in the Prophets and in the Psalms, has to be fulfilled.' He then opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'So you see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this.'
